History of Navigation

We are now skipping a few years and will look at the Medieval Marine Culture. This era started after the Roman Empire collapsed around the beginning of the 4th century. The most wellknown participants of the development of maritime navigation during that time were the Norsemen, better known as the Vikings, who first originated from Scandinavia, mainly Denmark, Norway and Sweden.

The inhabitants began building large seaworthy vessels during these early times. A crew of about two dozen paddled the wooden Hjortspring boat across the Baltic Sea long before the rise of the Roman Empire. The Scandinavians continued to develop better and bigger ships, incorporating iron and other metals into the design and developing oars for propulsion. The Nydam Oak boat of the year 315 AD measured sometimes over 100 feet in length. During the early Middle Ages, the Vikings (also known as Norsemen or Danes) developed the so called Longship, capababe of voyaging beyond sight of shore. This ship acquired a reputation for speed and agility. The Vikings used the navigating technology, already developed by the Phoenicians and improved on by the Romans of course. They also learned celestial navigation and other means of finding their way to other lands. They used the improved sail systems to propel their boats quickly in the winds of the North Sea.

Norwegian Vikings first attacked the isle of Portland in the British Iles in 787. They continued to demonstrate their naval prowess to dominate European trade and commerce for the next several centuries, establishing colonies along the European coast from the Baltic to the Balkans. They also sailed up many big rivers, establishing their dominance well inland through much of Russia and the Eastern European Territories. The Vikings successfully invaded Anglo-Saxon England and installed William the Conqueror as King.

As good as their naval abilities were, was also their prowess as land warriors. The Europeans had to live with the Vikings for several centuries.

The next time we will drift into the more advanced naval history.

Hi Everyone: Over the winter and spring months our courses of Pleasure Craft Operator Card, Boating Essentials, Seamanship, Maritime Radio have been presented as the student registration has required. A few changes in courses have given us another market option which is to offer the charting portion of the old Basic Course in a new course called Boating Essentials. The prerequisite for the Essentials Course is that the student needs to have a PCOC, from any supplier of operator cards which qualifies him for registration into the charting section which is somewhat more educational. By CPS allowing us to recognize any suppliers card it opens up a market of several million students across Canada. Our squadron already has registrations for the fall season for PCOC, Essentials, Seamanship and Maritime Radio. Our classes are certainly not as great in number as history records so theres always room and we very much appreciate early registration to help us with course materials. Fall classes will start in early October and continue as fits the student registrations. We will try to offer any of our other courses which are of interest. Check our website for details.
