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Larry and I travelled to the Caribbean this winter on a cruise. We travelled with Holland America Line and were gone for 10 days. Lauderdale in Florida and travelled to Half Moon Cay an island owned by Holland America, just about the most beautiful beach I have ever seen, the sand was so white and beautiful. A calm day at sea with entertainment on board culminated with a dinner in the dining room with great new friends from Great Britain, Austrailia, United States and some as close as St. Thomas and London. Had to stop for alligators in the Sawgrass, which they said if you ran your hand up it from bottom to top it was OK but if you ran your hand down it would certainly cut you all up. Was a great trip and learned a lot about the everglades, (not a swamp but a flowing waterway going out to sea. I learned that if you are an alligator trainer you stand in a small pool of water with two huge alligators and turn you back on them, not my idea of fun. Alligators are easy to train and for a treat they will do many tricks. If I was feeding them treats their trick would have been snapping my hand off I'm sure. Great time and would recommend a cruise to anyone. Good food, great friends, and hot sun, came home a little pink, or in Larry's case red. Hope to do another cruise another year.



2014 has had the biggest freeze in two decades on the Great Lakes. It has been so bitterly cold in the region for so long that the Great Lakes are almost completely covered with ice. The last time they came this close was in 1994, when 94 per cent of the lakes' surface was frozen. As of February ice cover extended across 88 per cent, according of the U.S. Government's Great Lakes Environmental Research Laboratory in Ann Arbor Michigan. The Great Lakes hold nearly one fifth of the freshwater on the world's surface, and harden almost every winter. freezing keeps the Fleet of U.S. and Canadian Coast Guard Vessels busy clearing paths for vessels hauling essential cargo such as heating oil, salt and coal. They could be breaking ice until the middle of May. The arctic vortex came down, and the ice just kept going. This deep freeze is more than a novelty. By limiting evaporation, it may help replenish lake water levels. Also getting relief are cities along the lakes that have been pummeled with lake-effect snow, which happens when cold air masses suck up moisture from open waters and dump it over land. Heavy ice can also protect fish eggs from predators, and it has delighted photographers, ice angler and daredevil snowmobilers.

At Apostle Island National Lakeshore in Wisconsin, the rock-solid cover has allowed around 35,000 visitors to trudge miles over Lake Superior to explore caves featuring dazzling ice formations. It's the first time in five years the lake surface has been firm enough to allow passage.

Good news for water levels, since the low-water period began in the late 1990's ships have been forced to carry lighter loads to avoid scraping bottom and with the heavy snow and rain in 2013 it has finally raised the water levers. The ice blocks evaporation, the leading cause of low water. It also will keep the lakes cooler for a longer time and delay the onset of the heavy evaporation season. Hopefully by the pleasure boating season we will have calm seas and lots of water to get in and out of all the places we used to be able to enjoy with a few friends, to anchor and have a great swim and a lunch before setting sail for home on a nice weekend.

HISTORICAL ORIGIN OF NAUTICAL TERMS

Sailors seem to have their own language. One could wonder why they muddle up simple terms, but the fact of the matter is that most of the nautical terms originated way back in maritime history and have a tradition that is centuries old. Following are just a few of the more common terms and widely accepted explanations out of many, for their origin.

Port and starboard seem needless ways to confuse left and right. But the origin can be traced back to a time when ships were steered with a long paddle called a steering board and because most men were right handed, it was placed on the right hand or steer board side. This evolved into starboard side.

With the steering board on the right, it was necessary to put the left side to the dock or port which became known as the port side. The older term for the left side, lard board (lar-board,) sounded so much like starboard the term port side came into wider use.

When ships were outfitted for war, holes were cut in the sides to accommodate the cannon. The French word for door is Porte and the cannon opening were called cannon ports. Eventually the term portal came to be used for any opening in the side of a ship.

Early sailing ships had no formal rest rooms. Instead there was a portion of the forward deck that overhung the water and it was here that sailors relieved themselves. The forward portion of a ship was referred to as the head of the ship, thus when sailors went forward to use the overhanging deck, they would simply say they were going to the head.

In sailboat races and in combat, there is a maneuver whereby one ship intentionally passes close by on the windward side, in order to deprive the enemy ship of any wind on its sails. This would cause the enemy ship to lose headway and give the aggressor an advantage. To this day we refer to someone who loses a debate as (having the wind taken out of his sails"

When ships anchored out of port, the sailors used a small sail boat to reach shore and the local pubs, the boat they used had sails controlled with three lines called sheets. Often the sailors were so drunk upon their return trip that no one controlled the sails and the three sheets went flying in the wind, thus the term "three sheets to the wind" Since these sailors were not paid on a regular basis, the bartenders kept track of their accounts on a posted list that contained the sailors name and a P for pints and a Q for quarts. The bartender would make his mark under the appropriate letter when paid. Since all bartenders were not totally honest it was important that the sailors minded their P's and Q's.

The term to intentionally sink a ship is to scuttle the ship. On early ships, water was held in a vessel called a hogshead or butt. Thus anytime sailors gathered around the butt for a drink of water, they would share rumors and rumors were said to have the potential to destroy or scuttle a ship or fleet. This is how the term scuttlebutt came into existence.

I hope you enjoyed this journey back into maritime history, but I have to end it now. The scuttlebutt around the head is that if we mind our P's and Q's we can go into port and get three sheets to the wing. Missing the tender would really take the wind out of my sails.
